

TREASURER'S REPORT

Dear Member,

On behalf of the entire committee I thank you for your continued support: your annual £25 Direct Debit (DD) subscription means the Society's financial reserves continue to grow. The review of our membership database undertaken by the AAGBI has highlighted that a minority of our members are still paying by Standing Order (SO). I would like to take this opportunity to respectfully appeal for those individuals with a SO to please change over to DD and help buttress our Society's foundations.

Our international membership is expanding, facilitated by the user friendliness of our PayPal account. The DAS survey scheme, newsletter adverts and equipment manufacturers page also represents an important, but variable additional source income throughout the year.

DAS has sponsored the Ugandan trainee scheme for 3 years now and our support will hopefully extend to future cohorts. We continue to fund the various DAS guideline committees and maintain the iDAS smart phone app. I am pleased to announce that the 2013 DAS Airway Research Grant, amounting to £14.4k, was recently awarded to Dr. Peadar O'Donohoe, an MRC training fellow in Oxford, for physiological studies of airway management and hypoxia. The funds have not yet been claimed at the time of writing.

Domain names have recently been purchased for the joint DAS/SAM World Airway Management Meeting (WAMM) to be held in Dublin during November 2015. Subsequently a website has been created: www.WAMM2015.com . DAS has also formally agreed to furnish the WAMM organizing committee with a £20k loan (with SAM providing £10k) although these loans have not yet been raised.

I anticipate the AAGBI's charges to fall in the coming months as their root and branch review of the societies' database is completed. The committee continue to look at ways to reduce their expenses.

The 2013 and 2014 Annual Scientific Meetings (ASM) local organizing committees have raised loans for £9k and £10k respectively. The £6k loan made to the DAS ASM 2012 is about to be repaid in full along with a considerable profit amounting to approximately £30k. DAS continues to administer accounts for the local organizing committees of the 2007 (Portsmouth) and 2012 (Cardiff) Annual Scientific Meetings plus the recipients of the 2010 NIAA grant. This money does not belong to DAS.

I look forward to the upcoming ASM in Ascot and hope to see you there.

ADEPT

I am pleased to say that by the end of this year we will have the "evidence for airway devices" section of the ADEPT website up and running. It has been a challenging process resulting from the vast number of devices available in the market today and finding a system that will be able to allow us to keep the website updated as more devices are added on an almost weekly basis.

The website will allow users access to the airway devices marketed in the UK and the evidence available for each of the listed devices. The available evidence will include all clinical trials, well designed and relevant animal and cadaveric studies but will exclude all case reports and manikin based trials on airway devices. The ADEPT website will offer access to the evidence but will not aim to classify the evidence for or against a particular device.

The industry has been very supportive of this venture and in providing us with data and we look forward to working with them in the coming years.

OBSTETRIC DIFFICULT AIRWAY GUIDELINE GROUP

The OAA/DAS difficult airway group has met on several occasions since my article in the last DAS newsletter. Great progress has been made. The group has been allocated time in the scientific programme at the DAS ASM in Ascot in November to update members about the progress of the guidelines.

The following sections will be discussed at Ascot:

1. Background papers:

The group is looking for evidence to back up the guidelines and aims to publish three papers prior to the final guidelines. The first paper is looking at case reports and case series of published failed intubations. The group aims to publish this in International Journal of Obstetric Anaesthesia. The second paper is looking at foetal outcome following failed intubations. The third paper will be on the management of the anticipated difficult airway in the obstetric patient.

2. Algorithms:

The group has started on drafts of the obstetric difficult airway guidelines algorithms.

3. Liaison with the DAS unanticipated difficult airway guidelines group:

This is to ensure that the two groups come up with similar recommendations in the Plan A of the Rapid Sequence Induction algorithm and Plan D sections to avoid giving conflicting messages.

4. A survey:

The group has decided to carry out a national survey of obstetric anaesthetic leads to gather information on the management of recent failed intubations. This will include equipment used and the use of awake fibre optic intubation in the obstetric patients. Special permission has been granted by the OAA to use their survey system.

FROM THE TRAINEE REP

Thank you for welcoming me onto the DAS Committee. The creation of the trainee representative role reflects the commitment that DAS has towards the development of future anaesthetists and I am very excited to have been given this opportunity by you.

I am currently a final year registrar in Oxford. I have experienced training in several different deaneries and have noticed a wide variation in delivery of airway training. Some based mainly on sporadic learning opportunities and others having a highly structured programme. I am planning to investigate whether there are differences between what trainees desire from their airway programmes and what trainers believe are important. The aims will be to identify discrepancies in goals, regional variations and constraints to the delivery of training. At the moment, we are awaiting collaboration with the Royal College of Anaesthetists on this project.

In the future I would like for all anaesthetic trainees, not just those completing a specialist fellowship, to have the confidence to utilise the range of anaesthetic equipment for appropriately managing a difficult airway. In this way, the necessary technical and non-technical skills will be more easily passed on to future trainees. I also believe that the ability to evaluate airway devices is crucial; the appointment of DAS Airway Leads in every trust will hopefully result in greater opportunities for trainees to become involved in ADEPT projects both locally and nationally.


